

PRAYING FOR UNREACHED PEOPLES

Lolak in Indonesia

Population: 18,000 Main Language: Indonesian Largest Religion: Islam Christian: 0.06% Evangelical: 0.06%

The Lolak are an agrarian people who have always lived on the fringes of more powerful neighboring groups. They live in the Lolak district in the northeastern portion of Sulawesi of the North Sulawesi province. The Lolak area is a fertile area with long black sand beaches, flat grassy fields, coconut plantations and rugged inland mountains. The Lolak are farmers who grow rice, coconuts, corn, cacao and large healthy cattle. The district has 20 elementary schools and most Lolak children are able to attend. Further education requires relocation. The Lolak are Sunni Muslim. The village of Lolak itself has three mosques. They interweave traditional beliefs with Islamic teaching and regard this as a positive influence for their hope of paradise.

Week of September 24, 2023

The gospel of Luke begins with the story of Zechariah and Elizabeth. What do we know about this couple based on Luke 1:5-7?

In Zechariah and Elizabeth's day people often thought that if you did not have children it was a sign of God's judgment. From what is said about them in verse 6, we know this is not the case. As Christians today, can we be tempted to look at the hardships of others and think that God is judging them? How can a story like this guard us from that temptation? Can you think of other Biblical stories that would help us avoid this error?

Zechariah and Elizabeth are said to have been "righteous before God" and to have "walked blamelessly in all the commandments and statutes of the Lord" (Luke 1:6). God's word says all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23), so this passage does not mean that this couple was sinless but acceptable to God. How was it that someone before the coming of Jesus Christ could be declared right with God (John 8:56; Gal. 3:6-9; Hebrews 11:13-16)?

When Zechariah went into the temple he encountered an angel. The angel told Zechariah that he and Elizabeth would have a son. Read Luke 1:11-17. What do we learn about this son and why is he significant?

What was Zechariah's reaction to the promise God was making him? Does God make us any promises? Do you or have you ever responded to God's promises like Zechariah? Why do we respond to God's promises like Zechariah?

God responds first to Zechariah's doubt by having the angel announce his name and where he comes from (Luke 1:19-21; Dan. 8:16–26; 9:21–27))? Why are these things significant in helping someone like Zechariah with his doubt?

The second thing that God does in response to Zechariah's doubt is give him a sign, albeit an unpleasant one. Has God provided enough for us today to believe his promises? Why or why not?

Is there a promise of God that you have a hard time believing? If you feel comfortable doing so, share this with your group and close your time together by praying for one another.
